BIENVENUE and welcome to the 25th silver jubilee edition of the French Film Festival UK

For any cultural endeavour to reach a quarter century is a milestone worth celebrating. Your 25th French Film Festival UK marks a significant notch on its calendar with a programme that is even richer and more comprehensive than ever before. Involving leading independent cinemas around the country from Glasgow and Edinburgh to London, from Inverness to Dundee and Belfast, from Warwick and Leicester to Chichester and Bristol. and so many more places in between watch out for the crème de la crème of contemporary and classic French-speaking cinema from 2 November to 17 December 2017.

With the support of a BFI Audience Fund award, programmers have chosen more than than 40 diverse titles for all tastes including boulevard hits, auteur choices, documentaries, animation and shorts as well as key films from the past including glorious restorations of *Indochine* by Régis Wargnier (screened in the very first French Film Festival in 1992), and Claude Berri's magnificent *Jean de Florette* and *Manon des Sources* for the first time in cinemas for many a year.

Among the guests scheduled to attend are the Oscar-winning Régis Wargnier for the anniversary screening of *Indochine*; second time director Blandine Lenoir and stellar talent Agnès Jaoui for *Aurora*; acclaimed Belgian director Lucas Belvaux for the hugely topical *This is Our Land*; exciting new talent Nicolas Fleureau for the nail-biting social thriller *Corporate*; return guests Abel and Fiona Gordon for the hilarious *Lost in Paris*; Lisa Azuelos for the musical biopic *Dalida*; and Marie Noëlle for *Marie Curie: the Courage* of Knowledge (screened to mark the 150th anniversary of the first female Nobel prizewinner's birth). Keep a close eye on the website (www.frenchfilmfestival.org.uk) for other guest appearances or updates.

Two titles honour great French artists Rodin and Gauguin incarnated respectively by those great actors Vincent Lindon and Vincent Cassel while two explorations delve into the lives and times of diverse musical legends Barbara and Dalida. Thousands of pupils will watch especially curated programmes for schools, giving them a first taste of films with subtitles and an understanding of the cultures of our European neighbours and those French speaking countries further afield.

Patron Sylvain Chomet (*Belleville Rendez-vous, The Illusionist, Atilla Marcel*) sent a jubilee message of good wishes: "Congratulations for an amazing 25 years to this gem of a Festival of which I became patron while making *The Illusionist* in Edinburgh. I love the informal atmosphere and the warm welcome guests always receive from the enthusiastic audiences. This Festival deserves support and encouragement from everyone." The late Jeanne Moreau, a previous Festival patron, receives a special homage in the year of her passing.

A chorus of "grand merci" as ever is due to sponsors, advertisers, funders, supporters, cinema colleagues, distributors, sales agents, and the dedicated Festival team without whom none of it would happen – and that would be so triste!



Start here for films by established directors as well as acclaimed titles from the festival circuit including Cannes where earlier this year such veterans as André Techiné (*Golden Years*), Philippe Garrel (*Lover for a Day*), Jacques Doillon (*Rodin*) all had new films alongside an earlier generation such as Michel Hazanavicius having fun with Jean-Luc Godard in *Redoubtable*, Carine Tardieu's hit comedy (*Just to be Sure*), François Ozon erotic thriller (*The Double Lover*), Laurent Cantet (on top form in *The Workshop*) and Emmanuelle Bercot (*150 Milligrams*) about a real life medical whistle-blower.

There are two widely different takes on celebrated French singers. *Barbara*, Mathieu Amalric's tribute to the "dame en noir" in which the director himself plays a film director with his ex-wife Jeanne Balibar as the grande dame is the edgier of the two. Lisa Azuelos's more conventional glittery biopic *Dalida* boasts an unknown Sveva Alviti in the title role. Amalric is also present on screen as another film-maker in *Ismaël's Ghosts*, his seventh collaboration with Arnaud Desplechin alongside Marion Cotillard, Charlotte Gainsbourg, and Louis Garrel (also to be seen as the great Godard in *Redoubtable*).

To mark the 150th anniversary of Marie Curie's birth Marie Noëlle offers a large-scale biography of the Nobel-Prize-winning physicist starring Polish actress Karolina Gruszka (in a role once taken by Isabelle Huppert). Another historical subject *A Bag of Marbles* draws for inspiration on the memoirs of Joseph Joffo about two Jewish boys in Second World War France. From today's headlines *This is Our Land* by Lucas Belvaux has as a background the rise of the forces of the National Front while Pierre Jolivet's *The Firemen* looks from the inside at the summer conflagrations along the Côte d'Azur.

For sheer unadulterated delight try *Lost in Paris* by and with Dominique Abel and Fiona Gordon adrift in the City of Light, the wacky shenanigans of *Problemos* by comedian Eric Judor or the versatile Noemie Lvovsky with *Tomorrow and Thereafter* dedicated to her mother. No Panorama selection would be complete without a major literary adaptation which comes in the form of *A Woman's Life*, an adaptation by Stephane Brizé of Guy de Maupassant's first novel.

150 Milligrams La Fille de Brest (N/C 15+)

The inspirational crusade of one dedicated doctor against a large-scale pharmaceutical company forms the basis of Emmanuelle Bercot's super-charged adaptation of real-life whistleblower Irène Frachon's bestselling memoir. Irène (Borgen's Sidse Babett Knudsen) is a hospital lung specialist who begins to suspect a connection between recent patient deaths and a medication called Mediator. Seeking solid proof to justify her suspicions, she joins forces with the hospital's head of research Antoine, played by Benoît Magimel. What follows is a long and rough road strewn with shady coverups, impenetrable institutional frameworks and powerful figures who are either corrupt or simply have their heads buried deep in the sand. Irène's determination in pursuing the cause catapults her into the spotlight. By challenging one unscrupulous company, she shakes the foundations of a system that has become inexcusably complacent.

A Bag of Marbles Un sac de billes (N/C 12+)

Based on the famous and acclaimed memoirs of Joseph Joffo, *A Bag of Marbles* offers a new version of his incredible story following the experiences of two young Jewish boys living in France during the Second World War. When Joseph Joffo was ten years old, his father (Patrick Bruel) gave him and his brother Maurice some money and a map and sent them on a dangerous mission to escape Nazi-occupied Paris in 1941. Making their way to the demilitarised zone in the South, the boys become unavoidably caught in the whirlwind of war. Aided by the occasional kind soul, the two young boys swerve and dart through obstacles set by Nazi soldiers to avoid succumbing to the dreadful fate of so many others.

A loving tribute to the icon of French song with a brilliant performance by Jeanne Balibar who has an uncanny physical resemblance to the late "Dame en noir" as the legend used to be called by her admirers. Mathieu Amalric (who won best director at Cannes for *On Tour*) directs Balibar, his ex-wife, in a film within a film. Balibar plays an actress called Brigitte who is cast to star in a film about Barbara with Amalric playing a director called Yves. At times it is deliberately difficult to know what is real and what is recreation as Amalric edits in material from documentaries but there's no doubt about the power of Balibar's performance.

Corniche Kennedy (N/C 15+)

Sensual, edgy, relentlessly honest and tender, *Corniche Kennedy*, directed by Dominique Cabrera, focusses on young people, their lives, dreams, and relationships. Taken from the eponymous novel by Maylis de Kerangal, Cabrera's film is set in Marseilles. The title refers to the Corniche du Président-John-Fitzgerald-Kennedy, a boulevard along the coast, and at its heart is a group of contemporary teens who defy the laws of gravity by plunging into the water from a height. A police chief, tasked with keeping an eye on this stretch of the coastline, observes them from behind her binoculars. The kids are caught between a zero-tolerance policy and their taste for the forbidden, and things are about to go awry...

Dalida (N/C 12+)

In the tradition of French chanson a singer's ability to sell the audience on the emotions of the song is everything. Few did this better than Dalida. Over the course of 30 years beginning in the 1950s, this Equpt-born Italian became a French idol with a guileless voice and sensual stage persona, selling 170 million records worldwide. But all that professional bliss came packaged with a fair amount of private torture. This glittery biopic faithfully chronicles the complexities of being a liberated woman in a less liberated era, as well as the ferocious passions of a life in which, despite all the triumphs, suicide became a recurring theme. Writer/director Lisa Azuelos made a bold decision to go with the unknown Sveva Alviti in the title role who incarnates the legend with style and confidence.

Francois Ozon's erotic thriller, about a woman Chloé (Marion Vacth from Young and Beautiful) who falls in love with Paul, her psychoanalyst (Jérémie Renier) but discovers there's more to him than meets the eve. sees the director back to his old tricks after the restrained Second World War saga Franz. His latest foray has style, sex appeal and a delicious streak of craziness. When Chloé and Paul move into their new apartment she discovers a box containing Paul's past, including a passport bearing a different surname. A web of secrets are about to be unleashed... 





The Artist director Michel Hazanavicius takes on the French New Wave and runs with it in style in *Redoubtable*. Charting the brief relationship of the iconic Jean-Luc Godard and Anne Wiazemsky (following the filming of La Chinoise, their marriage, and the May 1968 riots in Paris) Hazanavicius gives his subject a thorough going over, liberally sprinkled with irony, humour and affection. Yet fate holds a very different destiny for this woman's life. Betrayed by her husband, her son, and in many ways, her own idyllic youth, we follow Jeanne through the passing of time, as her dreams turn to disillusionments. A revelation in the title role, Chemla effortlessly encapsulates an expansive range of emotions and character developments while exceptional camera work, production design and costumes recreate every detail of Jeanne's world.

Nicolas Silhol takes the basis of true events to explore ruthless exploitation and greed in big companies in *Corporate*. That magnetic actor Vincent Cassel embraces the life and times of artist Paul Gauguin under Edouard Deluc's direction in Gauguin. Nicolas Bedos (son of actor and entertainer Guv Bedos) puts a spiky relationship under the microscope and over the decades in Mr & Mrs Adelman. And for completely different twists Sacha Wolff tackles a young rugby player from Wallis Island and his travails with a team in France in *Mercenary* while *Step by Step* by Mehdi Idir and Fabien Marsaud takes you from laughter to tears and back again in a tale of young people coming to terms with severe injuries. The selection is characterised by its diversity and the film-makers' ability to make challenging subjects accessible, moving and engaging.

Ivan Tsarevitch and the Changing Princess Ivan Tsarevitch et la princesse changeante (N/C 8+)

Renowned animator Michel Ocelot uses his unique and vibrant silhouette style to share a quartet of bewitching fairy tales, as told by a wizened projectionist and his young apprentices who meet nightly in a dilapidated theatre.

In the first a young girl who lives in a monster-fearing underground community gains the courage to face her fears and challenge her society in *The Mistress of the Monsters*. A poor Persian boy becomes apprentice to a powerful enchanter, only to learn of his dastardly ulterior motives in *The Sorcerer's Pupil*. The simple art of a master raconteur

Best known as the creator of Kirikou and the Sorceress, Kirikou and the Wild Beasts, and Azur and Asmar, Frenchborn, Guinea-raised animation director Michel Ocelot takes influences from various cultures around the world.

Although children love Michel Ocelot's films he does not make them with a junior audience in mind. His trick has always been not to create films for children. "Children might not understand my films but they see that I'm taking them seriously. The film registers and will help them later. They will understand later. The job of children is to learn."

So how did you get into animation? He says: "It was all about having fun when I was a child. I was always active – drawing, cutting, pasting and making gifts. I just went on." He had what he describes as a happy childhood, growing up in both Africa and in France, a multi-cultural background that he has used in his work.

"I was going to school in New Guinea. In the beginning me and my brother were the first two white children in our school. So my primary schooling was in Africa. I have only good recollections from this time. It was a time of total peace and harmony with only good people around me. There was no violence and at least five religions living well together."

He works swiftly, preparing everything meticulously in advance. He believes there is a birth of a golden age of animation in France. "The schools are outstanding and the students of animation amaze me. In France, we undoubtedly feel stronger and freer to do what comes naturally to us. For my part, I've always been independent. I've never tried to imitate the Japanese and the Americans even though I like their work."

How would he sum up his craft? "I'm a storyteller and the storyteller has no need to hide. One of the pleasures of fairytales is having a storyteller and playing with the audience. One of the pleasures of theatre is waiting for the curtain to go up. There's a whole artificial side, which must be retained. I really like never having to lie: what I show you are things I've completely made up. I don't hide the fact I've made them up and I even show you when I'm in the process of making them up. That's how fairytales work: we play together, we make-believe together and, gradually, we experience real things together."

Inevitably this master raconteur makes it all seem so incredibly simple.

Besides offering the best of contemporary French-speaking cinema the Festival has always paid attention to the glories of the past – this Silver Jubilee edition is no exception.

We dip into the archives of the very first edition of the Festival (then only *tout petit* in Edinburgh and Glasgow) to present screenings of the restored version of the Oscar-winning *Indochine* in the presence of director Régis Wargnier.

Another marker in our history is the tribute to Jeanne Moreau who was a patron from afar of the event in its early years and who can be seen in Jacques Demy's compelling *Bay of Angels*, Louis Malle's seminal *The Fire Within* and *The Lovers* and Joseph Losey's witty *Mr Klein*.

And as a special anniversary gift to our audiences we offer in sparkling restored copies those two Marcel Pagnol classics by the late Claude Berri, *Jean de Florette* and *Manon des Sources* with a memorable line-up of Gérard Depardieu, Yves Montand, Daniel Auteuil, Emmanuelle Béart and Elisabeth Depardieu.

When hunchback tax collector Jean de Florette (Gérard Depardieu) arrives in 1920s Provence from the city to take over the inheritance of a farm, peasant farmer César Soubeyran (Yves Montand) and his simple nephew, Ugolin (Daniel Auteuil), deprive his property of water so that they can drive him away and acquire the land for a pittance. Director Claude Berri spent six years trying to acquire the rights to Marcel Pagnol's two volume novel. Inspired by Pagnol's own 1952 feature, *Manon Des Sources*, the story chronicled the destruction of an educated outsider by avaricious provincials, who meet their match in his free-spirited daughter.

The tale resumes a decade later, focusing on Jean de Florette's beautiful daughter, Manon (Emmanuelle Béart), a shepherdess with whom Ugolin (Daniel Auteuil) falls hopelessly in love but fails to win. When Manon eavesdrops on hunters and learns the truth about the Soubeyrans and their plot against her father, she blocks the water supply to the village at its source in a cave only she knows about. Pandemonium ensues as Manon's scheme exacts revenge. Though deeply tragic, the story unfolds with charm, wit, and high spirits. Montand and Auteuil are superb in their roles as conniving villains who pay a terrible price, and Béart is magnificent as Manon.

Journey with a free spirit By Richard Mowe

Jeanne Moreau who died earlier this year at the age of 89, was not the obvious femme fatale although an essential accessory, a cigarette, was never far from her lips. One critic suggested that "her lips are too thick, her nose is not straight, her ears are too small and her legs are too thin." Even the "unglamorous" Moreau admitted on one occasion: "Other actors told me I was ugly."

Moreau had a chequered history with the men in her life including *The Exorcist* director William Friedkin whom she briefly married. She had a son Jerôme, a painter, by a previous marriage. And she was linked to actors Lee Marvin and George Hamilton.

I met Moreau in Paris at the beginning of the Nineties when I asked her to become an honorary Patron of the French Film Festival UK. Despite her fearsome reputation she agreed graciously and for the next few editions she sent warm messages of support. The four films on the following two pages are our way of showing our appreciation.

Born on 23 January 1926 Moreau's mother was an English dancer from Oldham who came to work at the Folies Bergères in Paris and her father earned a meagre living as a bar tender. As a child, Jeanne lay in her bedroom listening to the soundtracks of the films playing at the cinema next door. Her younger sister with whom she remained close, still lives in Brighton. Her younger sibling returned with their mother to Britain when she was 10, while Moreau stayed in France.

Journalist Marianne Gray who wrote a biography of the actress, said after her difficult upbringing "she spent the rest of her life trying to learn how to build up trust and love for other people."

Her career began on the stage at the Comédie-Française and she acted in films from 1948 on. She was noticed by the young director Louis Malle, who cast her in *Lift to the Scaffold* and, more notably, *Les Amants (The Lovers)* in which Moreau played an upper-class housewife who finds salvation via sexuality.

In the 1950s, Moreau's performances helped launch many of the French New Wave of filmmakers. She starred in Francois Truffaut's classic *Jules and Jim*, where she played Catherine, who (in Gray's words) is "egocentric, unreliable and for the most part completely unaware of the torment through which she puts her men... she was the first truly 'modern' screen woman, the first female free spirit we had seen on film."

She worked with an amazing array of directors. *The Trial* (Orson Welles), *Eva* (Joseph Losey), Peau de Banane (Max Ophuls), *La Notte* (Michelangelo Antonioni), *La Baie des Anges* (Jacques Demy), *Moderato Cantabile* (Peter Brook), *Diary of a Chambermaid* (Luis Buñuel), *The Sailor From Gibraltar* (Tony Richardson), and *Querelle* (Rainer Werner Fassbinder). She won the best actress award at Cannes in 1960 for Moderato Cantabile.

Moreau preferred to work on productions where she knew everyone by name. Because of this she eschewed working a lot in the States and turned down such films as the Mrs. Robinson part in *The Graduate* and the Nurse Ratched role in *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest.*

As she matured she happily played older women who romanced younger men, thereby breaking another perceived taboo. She also started directing films of her own, with some success.

Several years ago, she won plaudits for playing a colourful artist in Laurent Heynemann's *The Old Lady Who Walked in the Sea*. And more recently there was *Map of the Human Heart* (1992) and *The Proprietor* (1997). She struck up a close friendship with director Josée Dayan who directed her in *Cet Amour-Là* (2001), a portrait of a celebrated love affair between legendary novelist, scriptwriter, and film director Marguerite Duras's age. She was still working at the age of 84 when in 2013 she played Frida, a grande dame living in an elegant apartment who has to work out a way of getting on with Anne (Laine Magi), an Estonian divorcee, who has been hired to be her carer in *A Lady in Paris/Une Estonienne à Paris*, directed by Ilmar Raag.

She embraced her advancing years saying: "The privilege of age is that I have more confidence and I am calmer. I know more about myself."

Régis Wargnier: Stories in which love triumphs over politics.

Director with an epic sweep

Régis Wargnier, who made his international breakthrough in 1991 with the Oscar-winning *Indochine*, learned his craft on the job.

He had stints working as a second unit director with the late Michel Deville before scoring his own directorial debut with *La femme de ma vie* starring Jane Birkin and Jean-Louis Trintignant.

International fame followed including *Indochine* which also won a Golden Globe, and East/West. He has worked with many of France's leading actresses, including Catherine Deneuve, Sandrine Bonnaire and Emmanuelle Béart who took the lead role in *Une femme française* inspired by Wargnier's own mother.

East/West was nominated for best foreign language film in the Academy Awards. When it was released in France some critics described it as anti-Communist. Yet, in a sense, it is no more anti-Communist than *Indochine*, which dealt with the struggle against French colonialism, was pro-Communist. Both films are love stories in which love is tested by – and eventually triumphs over – politics.

In 2004 the director came to Edinburgh to part-shoot *Man to Man*, a British and French co-production, depicting the search for the so-called "Missing Link" – the connection between man and ape much discussed by scientists in the 19th century. After the anthropologists encounter a tribe of pygmies in South Africa, they send a couple back to Scotland for research purposes. *Man to Man* portrays not just the beginnings of modern evolutionary science, but also its unscrupulous abuse for selfish motives. Last year he travelled back to Vietnam with Catherine Deneuve to present Indochine in the Hanoi International Film Festival – 25 years after it was made.

Paradoxically *Indochine* was never released in Vietnam at the time of its international release in 1992, a period when the country's cinema sector was virtually non-existent.

A single preview screening was organised in the only cinema operating at the time, the Thàng8 (which now has been fully renovated), attended by Deneuve and Wargnier who also served as the festival's jury president.

The film is credited with playing a significant role in boosting the international image of Vietnam and contributed to some extent to the nation's cultural renaissance.

Wargnier's fascination for this part of the world found further expression in his latest foray, *The Gate*, which was set in Cambodia during the Khmer Rouge regime.

An adaptation for the screen of the book, *Le Portail*, by François Bizot it details the author's detention and subsequent liberation. Bizot worked as a researcher with the French Research School of the Far East but was kidnapped by the Khmer Rouge in the early stages of the conflict.

Over the years Wargnier who turns 70 next year, has struck a harmonious working relationship with Scots composer Patrick Doyle who has written the music for most of his films, including the epic score for *Indochine*.

An epic historical romance directed by Régis Wargnier and set in Indochina (later Vietnam) with Catherine Deneuve as a plantation owner who begins a passionate affair with a young naval officer (Vincent Perez). In the hothouse atmosphere of the setting the officer falls in love with Deneuve's adopted daughter (Linh Dan Pham). She follows him when he is posted to a remote outpost. The lovers hope to hide themselves amid the islands of a secret lake. All the components are in place for a lush and sensual old-fashioned (in a good way) melodrama which is as seductive as the stunning Vietnamese landscape. It has been described as a Gallic *Gone With the Wind*, imbued with the sense of decadence of a dying colonial regime. Deneuve has the role of a lifetime and seizes the chances with an ageless elegance.






A Bag of Marbles Un sac de billes (N/C 12+)

AGNES JAOUI One of France's most successful female directors she also writes and stars in her own films, alongside her one-time partner Jean-Pierre Bacri. She and Bacri developed a theatre and film style of which *Kitchen with Apartment* and *Family Resemblances* were first to meet with success. They worked with Alain Resnais on *Smoking/No Smoking* and *Same Old Song*. In 2000, Agnès Jaoui directed *The Taste of Others*, which was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film and won four César, including the César Award for Best Film. She wrote and directed *Look at Me*, which won Best Screenplay Award at the 2004 Cannes Film Festival, followed by *Let's Talk About the Rain* (2008) and *Under the Rainbow* (2013). She is a singer, and her Latin "Canta" album won a Victoire de la Musique award in 2007. She returned to the stage in 2014, and regularly appears on screen, most recently in Bruno Podalydès' *The Sweet Escape* in the French Film Festival UK official selection last year. She attends the Festival for the first time this year to present *Aurora* by Blandine Lenoir.

BLANDINE LENOIR She began as an actress in front of Gaspard Noé's camera in the short *Carne* (1991) and worked for him again on *I Stand Alone* in 1998, his first feature. She pursued her career as an actress but at the same time embarked on directing. She has already directed eight shorts, including *Dear Abbot*. Her first feature film *Zouzou* was released in 2014. She accompanies Agnès Jaoui to the Festival for *Aurora*, her second feature. She was inspired by Agnès Varda to take up directing after she had seen *Sans toit ni loi* in the mid-Eighties – the first time she had seen film about a woman by a woman. She made her first short film at the age of 25 – *Avec Marinette* but it took ten years or so before making a feature.

REGIS WARGNIER After studying classics, Wargnier gave up his place at the film school l'IDHEC, preferring to learn the trade of director on film sets. He was first stand-in for Michel Piccoli for Claude Chabrol's Le Décade Prodigeuse (1972), then focus puller and location manager on features (Valerio Zurlin's Le Désert des Tartares, 1977) then assistant director to François Girod, Volker Schlöndorff, Margaret von Trotta, Elie Chouragui, and Alexandre Arcady. Wargnier directed his first feature La Femme de ma Vie with Jane Birkin and Christophe Malvay, in 1986. Three years later he made Je Suis le Seigneur du Château. Indochine (1992) boasting a prestigious cast including Catherine Deneuve, Vincent Pérez, Dominique Blanc and Jean Yanne, was an international hit, and was awarded the Oscar for Best Foreign Film. In 1996, Emmanuelle Béart incarnated Une Femme Française alongside Daniel Auteuil. East-West, with Sandrine Bonnaire, was the French entry in the 2000 Academy Awards, and was also nominated for the best film, best director and best actress Césars that year. For his most recent feature he teamed up with Cambodian filmmaker Rithy Panh to bring Francois Bizot's bestselling autobiographical novel The Gate to the screen. With career spanning more than 25 years the Festival is delighted to welcome him in the 25th edition to present silver jubilee screenings of *Indochine* in a restored copy.

LUCAS BELVAUX Born in Namur, the Belgian director has put his name to works such as his trio of films released in 2002 (*An Amazing Couple, After Life* and On the Run), *The Right of the Weakest* (entered in competition at Cannes in 2006), *Rapt* (2009), *38 Witnesses* (One Night) which opened the International Film Festival Rotterdam and his out of character romantic comedy *Not My Type* (2014 and presented at the French Film Festival in 2015). After spending his childhood in the countryside, he decided to move to Paris to become an actor. After a few month of acting classes, he landed a part in a TV movie, followed by his first feature film, *Allons z'enfants* by Yves Boisset. Ten years later, he wrote and shot his first film, *Parfois trop d'amour* (1992). His films are often grounded in a strong sociological context, and question the underlying currents of society. *With This is Our Land* he goes a step further, delivering a film of scorching political topicality on the mechanisms of seduction used by populist parties, seen through the eyes of a young nurse who supports them almost unwittingly.

THE FIRST FRENCH FILM

FESTIVAL took place in October 1992, the year the European Council of the European Parliament met in Edinburgh for a Euro-summit during the UK's presidency of the EC. It was created on the initiative of two film journalists Richard Mowe and Allan Hunter who ran the festival in tandem for a number of years.

Hunter now has relinquished the reins to concentrate on other activities, including the Glasgow Film Festival. Mowe is now director of the French Film Festival UK, director of the distribution company CinéFile as well as continuing

his media activities. Ilona Morison now has joined the FFF UK team as deputy director. 1992 was the year of guest Josiane Balasko (on the cover of the first edition brochure with Daniel Auteuil in *Ma vie est un enfer*), guest Gérard Jugnot for *Une epoque formidable, Indochine, Madame Bovary* and then newcomer Arnaud Desplechin's *La Vie des morts*. An Air France photographic archive was on show on the walls of Edinburgh Filmhouse. Today the Festival takes place around the UK with screenings in leading independent cinemas in more than 30 different locations.

French films don't often broach work place issues, with the exception of the memorable *Work Hard, Play Hard* (screened at the Festival in 2005). Now *Corporate* skilfully takes possession of the subject (with a screenplay written by the director Nicolas Silhol with Nicolas Fleureau) by exploring the responsibility of devoted workers charged with orchestrating "management through terror". This personal ethical dilemma is faced by human resources manager Emilie Tesson-Hansen (played by the outstanding Céline Sallette) in a film that is both gripping and pertinent.
